
At the Virginia Foundation for Independent Colleges (VFIC), we're committed to making sure students who want to earn a college degree have the opportunity to do so. That's especially true for under-resourced students from diverse cultural, racial, ethnic, and financial backgrounds. One of the ways we accomplish this goal is by creating scholarships that not only provide students with access to higher education but, through ongoing financial support, sustain their enrollment from one year to the next `toward graduation.



Universal Leaf Foundation has played an instrumental role in our success. How? By generously supporting the VFIC Brighter Futures Scholarship Program, as well as our annual fund. Since becoming a partner in helping us fulfill our mission, Universal Leaf Foundation has provided scholarships for nearly 550 students. And through unrestricted gifts to our annual fund, they have helped fund programs that provide students with experiential/hands-on learning opportunities outside the classroom.

Seventeen colleges and universities form the VFIC consortium, blanketing the Commonwealth of Virginia with exceptional institutions of higher education and enriching the communities they call home. The consortium includes Bridgewater College, Emory & Henry College, Hampden-Sydney College, Hampton University, Hollins University, Mary Baldwin University, Marymount University, Randolph College, Randolph-Macon College, Roanoke College, Shenandoah University, Sweet Briar College, University of Lynchburg, University of Richmond, Virginia Union University, Virginia Wesleyan University, and Washington and Lee University. These schools educate nearly 30,000 students, 24,000 of whom are undergraduates.

VFIC MEMBER SCHOOLS



VFIC schools are racially, culturally, and economically diverse. According to current research from the State Council of Higher Education in Virginia, 42 percent of VFIC undergraduates come from minority backgrounds. Thirty percent of undergraduates receive a PELL Grant. More than 23 percent of the students on our campuses fall into the first-generation category. With enrollments between 450 and 4,200 students, our schools teach a broadly pragmatic liberal arts and sciences education in environments that value and encourage ethical leadership and responsible citizenship.

In addition to providing students with the financial support they need to attend college, we also develop programs that complement each school's traditional in-class instruction. Funding from Universal Leaf Foundation has supported this valuable component of education, too. These programs provide students with opportunities to secure an education that includes real-world experiences outside the classroom.



Our programs include the following:

Brighter Futures Scholarship Program

Provide VFIC students who have financial need with scholarship funding that enables them to pursue their dream of securing a college degree.

STEM Education Workshops

Facilitates the sharing of knowledge and instructional methodology among VFIC schools and faculty to enhance science education.

Heat Watch

Works with students, faculty, and volunteers from more than a dozen colleges and universities across the state to collect data about how heat varies across communities and to understand where residents are most at risk during extreme heat waves.

Building Transfer Pathway Connections

Engages faculty and staff from thirteen VFIC schools in a collective effort to facilitate student transfer capacity from Virginia's community colleges to VFIC colleges.

Undergraduate Research Fellowships and Scholarships

Enables students to gain valuable experience from direct participation in the creation, discovery, and use of new ideas and technologies.

VFIC Women's Leadership Development Summit

Offers young women from VFIC schools the opportunity to hear from corporate and civic leaders about how to assume roles of authority in professional and personal settings.

Ethics Bowl (held annually since 1999)

Matches student teams from each of our sixteen member colleges to address contemporary ethical dilemmas in a highly competitive event.

Enhancing Career Preparation for Underrepresented Students

Complements the work of career development officers at VFIC schools by providing them with the special resources they need to help underrepresented students secure a fulfilling, lucrative job upon graduation, as well as a rigorous, educational internship during their undergraduate years.

Virtually all of our Brighter Futures Scholarship recipients graduate in four years. That's a testament to their discipline, focus, and financial responsibility. And for students who are Pell Eligible, these scholarships contribute to student retention. Students who can afford to stay enrolled graduate on time and move into the workforce more quickly, ready to begin their careers, as well as enjoy financial independence and economic mobility.
